2023 – ongoing **Propcom +, Nigeria -** Working as a subcontractor to The Palladium Group on this seven year FCDO funded project, which aims to promote market systems development for climate-smart agriculture in Nigeria. The Policy Practice will be providing expertise on building a political economy and conflict sensitivity approach into the markets systems development initiatives to be supported by Propcom+ in diverse sectors including climate smart crop varieties, poultry vaccination, e-extension, sustainable forestry and carbon capture.

Feb -Dec 22 **Demography Political Economy Analysis**, **Nigeria** - completed a political economy analysis on the demographic transition in Nigeria. Based on detailed fieldwork in 11 locations, the study addresses the question of what are the political, economic and socio-cultural factors influencing population policy and outcomes. It identified six potential pathways of change towards a more rapid demographic transition and makes recommendations on how development partners can support these pathways.

Other assignments included participation in and led PEA-based analyses on civil society and governance support programmes, and technical assistance pool programmes in Nigeria, African Union taxation strategies, Nigeria's Federal Ministry of Environment implementation capacity, and demographic trends and policies.
